Although Portstewart cannot boast of richness in old ruins, it has been the home of those who wielded a mighty influence among men, and secured for themselves a name that will live in the hearts and homes of the people for generations to come. Amongst these are the names of Dr. Adam Clarke [to whose memory a handsome Memorial (Methodist) Church, capable of seating two hundred persons, has been erected), Dr. Charles Lever, the talented novelist, and Sir George White. The town is connected with the Portrush branch of the Northern Counties Railway by a steam tramway, which has been acquired by this Company, so that visitors have no difficulty in reaching it by rail, and we have no doubt when it becomes more widely known it will become more liberally patronised than it has been in the past. In order to attract visitors a golf club was established in 1895, which has added to the popularity of the town. A much-felt want in the way of a public hall has now been erected at the cost of £700, towards which Mrs. Cromie subscribed the handsome sum of £200. There is in connection with this building reading rooms, recreation rooms, and coffee rooms. The town can also boast of having in its midst a beautiful Orange Hall, which as opened by the Earl of Erne.

POYNTZPASS.

POYNTZPASS is situated eight miles north of Newry and four miles from Tandragee. It occupies a position on the borders of Armagh and Down, a small part of the town being in the latter county. It is a station on the Great Northern Railway, and there are quays on the canal, where lighters discharge coal brought from Newry. There is a good cattle fair on the first Saturday in each month, for the accommodation of buyers, at which the railway company have lately made several improvements, which greatly facilitate the railing of beasts. A market is held every Friday for fowl, butter, and eggs. Poyntzpass was anciently called Fenwick Pass, and was one of the four "passes" across the morasses, which at all other places were impassable in the valley between Newry and Gilford, through which now runs side by side the Newry Canal and the Great Northern Railway. Each of these "passes" was formerly protected by a castle, the remains of which have been long since removed. A short distance to the east of Poyntzpass are portions of remarkable earthworks known as the "Glen of the Black Pig" or the "Danes' Cart," but which may more correctly be termed the Great Wall of Ulidia or Ulster, which was formed in A.D. 352 by the Ulidians or Ulstermen after their defeat and the destruction of the palace of their kings at Enmania or Navan, near the city of Scarva to Meigh, near Jonesborough, and is can be traced from Lisnagade on the north of Scarva to Meigh, near Jonesborough, which was a most remarkable erection. The Parish Church is a neat, modern building, which was enlarged and improved in 1893. It stands on a gentle elevation at the south end of the town. The present rector of the parish is Rev. W. F. Johnson, M.A.
