To meet the requirements of income patronage the owners of houses in the village have within recent years made great provements, both externally and internally, and the granting of perpetuity leases by landlady has given a remarkable impetus to the building trade, which, it is believed it result in the addition of numerous villa residences on a scale even more complete in artistic than any hitherto erected.
